

I Reading comprehension exercise: read the text before answering questions 1 to 8 below.

"Has the dentist's drill had its day?"

Nobody likes going to the dentist, and a big reason for this is the sound of the dentist's drill. Thanks to the invention being developed for use in surgeries, however, we may no longer have to suffer its terrible screech.

The man behind the technology, Professor Brian Millar of the King's Dental Institute, was inspired by work on a device aimed at blocking out road noise for drivers of luxury cars while still allowing **them** to hear emergency vehicles' sirens. Professor Millar and his colleagues at three London universities have found a way of removing the noise of the drill for patients, but no one else using a gizmo called the digital signal processor.

Using microphones placed close to the drill, the digital signal processor monitors the sound waves that it produces. Professor Millar's machine then produces sound waves that are inversions, or exact opposites, of the sound waves of the drill. These anti- noise sound waves are then sent direct to the patient's ears via headphones. The procedure is most effective at cancelling out the sound of the drill when the headphone wearer is listening to music. Anyone who wants to make use of the technique, then, will be invited to have their MP3 player or music-playing mobile phone switched on and connected to the new device while in the dentist's chair. That's something, of course, which could in itself make a visit to the dentist much more pleasant for a lot of us!

Better yet, you don't have to worry about not hearing your dentist's instructions or reassuring voice. The sound cancellation system reacts only to the very high- frequency sound of a dental drill, and not to lower- frequency sounds such as that of a human voice.
